


# Birds at the Met Office

### General trends

Volunteers from the Met Office began monitoring bird species on site in mid-2013. 256 transects around the building have been conducted over the past eleven years, and we can now see how the number of birds our habitats support varies month-by-month.

To the right is the average number of birds counted on a survey each month, and despite the totals being quite variable, the mean trend line shows a decrease from winter through to summer, followed by an increase in sightings in autumn.




## Indicator species

The Met Office also supports several 'Birds of Conservation Concern' based on conservation criteria - historical decline, trends in population and range, rarity, localised distribution and international importance.




Total number of red list bird sightings across 7 years



# Redwing Variable number of sightings with a record of 120 in 2023. Moorhen Moorhen has seen a decline over the survey years but did well in 2023 with 77 recorded. Woodpigeon Variable number of sightings averaging 164.7 per annum over the period 2014 – 2023 peaking at 241 in 2016. Wren Variable number of sightings with a record of 37 sighted in 2015.

Other amber list species include Reed Bunting, Dunnock, Mallard, Song Thrush, Lesser Black Backed Gull and Meadow Pipit
